Camp Loughridge provides an Autism Inclusion Program which is designed to give children with autism between the ages of 6-13 a typical outdoor camp experience in an inclusion environment among the other 200 weekly campers in our Summer Day Camp and Adventure Day Camp. Camp counselors are trained to assist campers with autism and every camper in the Autism Inclusion Program is paired with a designated counselor in addition to being in a tribe with other kids their age. Camp activities may include swimming, hiking, chapel, team sports, and crafts. There are 7 one-week sessions beginning in June. Each session is limited to 2 campers with autism per session and is filled on a first come first served basis. Scholarships are available.
